Hotel Performance - NI

January-December 2022

Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency (NISRA) accommodation statistics for January-December 2022 indicate hotel room and bed occupancy each experienced a small decline compared with the same period pre-pandemic. Year-to-date room sales also decreased slightly in 2022 compared with 2019. Room occupancy for the month of December 2022 increased by 3 percentage points compared to December 2019, while room sales experienced growth of 5%.

Room and Bed Occupancy

- Northern Ireland (NI) year-to-date (YTD) hotel room and bed occupancy figures sit at 66% and 51% respectively. These represent a 1 percentage point decline in room occupancy and a 3 percentage point decline in bed occupancy compared to 2019.
- Given the challenging start to 2022 when the Omicron variant had a significant impact on performance, these YTD figures have exceeded expectations and are encouraging as we progress into 2023.
- Looking at individual monthly performance, room occupancy in December 2022 (57%) was up by 3 percentage points compared to December 2019. This followed on from a very positive November to give a strong performing end to 2022.

Room and Bed Sales

- Room sales in the month of December 2022 experienced growth of 5% compared to December 2019. This followed on from growth of 11% in November 2022.
- Despite this, YTD room sales remain 1% below 2019, the same figure reported in last month's report.
- Bed sales in November 2022 were also 5% higher than 2019, matching the 6% increase seen in October.
- As a result, YTD bed sales are now 2% above the December bed sales in 2019. Last month's report showed YTD bed sales only marginally exceeding 2019 figures.
- 4.0m bed sales in 2022 is a new record high for NI hotels.





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Hotel Performance - NI

January-December 2022

Performance during January-December 2022 varied across NI Local Government Districts (LGD). Belfast City recorded the highest room occupancy of all the NI LGDs (72%), and was also the only LGD to match pre-pandemic room occupancy levels.

January-December 2022

Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency (NISRA) accommodation statistics for January-December 2022 indicate that guesthouses, guest accommodation and B&Bs (GH/GA/BB) experienced increases in both room occupancy and sales compared to 2019 figures. Performance suggests this sector is continuing to progress better in its recovery than hotels.

Room and Bed Occupancy

- Northern Ireland guesthouses, guest accommodation and B&Bs (GH/GA/BB) have had a positive January-December 2022 period, with figures indicating that this sector continues to be further along in its recovery than the hotel sector.
- GH/GA/BB room occupancy in the month of December 2022 saw growth of 9pps compared to the same month in 2019, while bed occupancy increased by 4pps.
- Breaking this sector down further, guesthouses YTD room and bed occupancy saw increases of 2pps and 6pps respectively. B&Bs saw a 4pps decline in room occupancy and no change in bed occupancy. Guest accommodation saw a 6pps growth in room occupancy and a 3pps growth in bed occupancy.

Room and Bed Sales

- There have been over 554,000 rooms and more than 952,000 bed spaces sold in guesthouses, guest accommodation and B&Bs in 2022 – a record year for both KPIs.
- NI GH/GA/BB room sales for January-December 2022 have increased by 21% compared to January-December 2019.
- Looking at individual monthly performance, room sales in December 2022 grew significantly (+62%) compared to December 2019. This follows on from increases of 45% in November, 28% in October and 31% in September.
- December 2022 bed sales also saw large growth of 44%.
 This follows on from 44%, 42% and 12% increases respectively in November, October and September 2022.

January-December 2022

Room and bed-space occupancy varied across Local Government Districts (LGDs) during January-December 2022. Belfast City LGD recorded the highest room occupancy (64%) by a considerable margin, while Belfast City and Lisburn & Castlereagh each recorded the largest increase in room occupancy compared with January-December 2019 (+12pps).
